Reports:

President's report - Jean -

- 1. Regionalisation information was sent out to all Rotarians.
- 2. The Australia Day BBQ will be held at St Marys pool. Food supplies are covered by Council. Drinks, and egg and bacon will be purchased to sell at the BBQ. Jo at Penrith is organising the roster. Please contact her to add your name.

Secretary's report - (in Andrew's absence). Jean passed on New Years wishes to our club from Rajeev (a previous exchange student). Rotary magazines (international) were handed out.

Treasurer's report - Alex - The BBQ weekend - Saturday was very hot. Saturday's earnings were \$1136 gross. 53% on the Square. On Sunday, all the food was sold until the rolls ran out. Earnings were \$1393 gross. 38% on the Square. Net profit for the weekend was \$1266.50. There was no Bunnings BBQ on Sunday. There were two chefs on Sunday, Chris (Jean's grandson) and Richard, which were much needed. And special thanks to Debbie who travelled from Lane Cove.

Leftover sausages went to ESQ to try and get someone to do the Return and Earn while Terry is away. Someone did offer.

Vocational report - Terry - We now have an account at Vinnies, which allows for the cans and bottles to be just handed over to Vinnies. They feed them through and deposit the resulting funds into the Service Account.

On 14th February, our authority to fundraise expires. The name on the authority is very out of date. Terry has sent an email to Gambling NSW to try and fix this before that date.

Pride of Workship is very expensive, and will be in April, not March. There are problems with getting enough numbers to balance the books. There was discussion about company versus individual nominations. The overall problem is to cover costs. Jason suggested that the local member could help with that.



Jason also suggested that he could organise a visit to the Royal Flying Doctor Service at Bankstown Airport. He was given 2 dates to play with - 7th or 21st March.

Foundation report - Glenn - The hamper project is closed. There is no written feedback from recipients. It all needs to be wound up. Alex has all the receipts. Glenn reminded us that we need to start planning for next year.

Social committee - Gayl - Will check the dates for TAFE dinners and get back to the club.

Community service - Bronwyn - The cube is working well. We are now alternating between deliveries to Penrith Community Kitchen, the Haven, and Mama Lana's. Rossco doesn't seem to do food any more. the food storage and display area has gone.

The escape bags for the Womens' Refuge are planned probably for April, depending on preparation time needed.

General business:

- 2. The conference on 16-17th March still has some day vacancies on Saturday.
- 3. Induction of Jason Cornelius.

Jason was inducted to the club and will be a team member for Terry in vocational as well as helping with publicity.

Mario on the past and future of our club

Our club is a member of RI, and we are all volunteers. We are in Zone 8 which includes Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and several Pacific Island countries.



In 1975, Penrith club were our parents. By mid-1976, 30 people had been found to form a new club. We were chartered in 1977 as the Rotary Club of South Penrith in District 969. The district was later renamed District 9690. In more recent years, this district was divided into North and South Sydney and was very disruptive. At around the turn of the century, our club's name was changed to Penrith Valley to remove the restriction of the South Penrith name, since at one time, territories were strictly enforced. Our preference had been to call it Nepean, but was told by higher ups that that was not acceptable. Later Penrith Sunrise became known as Nepean.

Regionalisation is our latest concern. Mario had hoped to hear more at PETS, but Richard will be deputising for him on that day. Mario wonders how we will relate to the Pacific Islands, especially the French ones. Regionalisation will be reviewed in two years by bureaucracy. We will watch and see.

Our biggest worry - Will regionalisation risk our Club's autonomy?

Question: Women in Rotary. In the early 1990s, a woman applied to become a Rotarian. The possibility that this was contrary to the RI constitution was pursued all the way to the Supreme Court in the US and it was decided that women were allowed. Robyn was the first woman member of our club in 1998, and may have been the first in District 9690.

Alex, Shiva and Mario have been in Rotary for decades. They listed their reasons as giving back, friendships, which also lead to service, and assisting the community both locally and internationally.

When Mario becomes president next year, it will be 40 years since his first presidency.
